PARENT'S CORNER

Nurturing Young Hearts: A Guide to Social and Emotional Development in 4-6 Year Olds

The emotional world of children aged 4-6 is a complex and fascinating one. At this stage, they're navigating big feelings while developing social skills. A major challenge they face is emotional regulation; they can feel intense joy one moment and deep frustration the next, leading to sudden mood swings, crying spells, and tantrums. Their growing independence often clashes with their need for comfort and control, which can manifest as crankiness or selective food choices.

As adults, we can provide a supportive environment. The key is to validate their feelings without giving in to the undesirable behavior. Instead of dismissing their emotions, say, "I see you're angry," and then redirect them. For tantrums, stay calm and wait it out. A simple hug can often work wonders. For fussy eating, try involving them in meal preparation, making it a positive experience. Consistent routines, clear boundaries, and open communication are powerful tools. Teach them to name their emotions ("Are you feeling



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sad?"). Remember, patience and empathy are your greatest allies in helping them feel comfortable and secure.
