HSCP Induction, Corporal Punishment & POCSO Training

Ryan International Academy, Sarjapur is committed towards providing a safe learning environment and safeguarding children's rights and safety against any offenses. A training workshop was organized on 13th September 2024, i.e. Friday at Ryan International Academy, Sarjapur.

Respected Principal Ms. Sripurna Sarma conducted a session on "Protection of Children from Sexual Offenses Act (POCSO). The workshop on POCSO Act was organized with the primary objective of educating teachers on the legal framework, responsibilities, provisions and best practices related to child protection. She discussed the important features of this Act, like complete privacy, age of consent is irrelevant, mandatory reporting and gender neutrality. She also shed light on the processes under the POCSO Act, like processes at the police station, at the Child Welfare Committee, for the medical examination of the child, at the Special Court and the role of Police. Case studies and real-life scenarios were presented to enhance their ability to identify possible victims. The also explored preventive measures, including the importance age-appropriate sex education, open communication with students, and building a culture of trust within the school community. The workshop served as a crucial step in empowering school staff to fulfill their duty as protectors of children's rights and safety.

Training was also regarding HSCP (Health Safety and Child Protection) and Corporal punishment. She explained about the HSCP culture that ensures happy children, staff and parents, leading to a positive school working environment. The sole aim is to reduce or prevent serious injuries, accidents, harm and abuse. She addressed that Corporal Punishment violates children's rights to enjoy their lives of health issues through direct physical harm and mental torture, which affects children's cognitive and mental development. It also negatively affects children's cognitive development. It develops aggression in children and affects children's moral values and relationships with families and other people. She emphasized the role of school staff members in corporal punishment. All school members must ensure that all children enjoy their rights as per the RTE Act. All children should be treated in school in a manner that motivates children to stay in school and learn. No physical punishment will be given by anyone to the children, and it will not be permitted. Mental harassment should not be permitted in school. No form of discrimination should be permitted in school based on religion, caste, disability, gender, class, etc. The school environment should be kept free of any fear, trauma, or prejudice by all the school members.

Training was extremely beneficial and valuable for the safe and secure functioning of the school.

Teachers Training Workshop on Psychological First Aid

"PFA isn't about fixing everything. Being a supportive presence can make difference!" Psychological First Aid (PFA) provides a framework to better prepare individuals to identify signs of distress, engage in supportive and active listening, and understand how to link individuals with additional care when needed. To gain insights about Psychological First Aid (PFA), Teacher's Training workshop а organized on 21st September 2024, i.e. Saturday at Ryan International Academy, Sarjapur. We expressed heartfelt thanks to an exemplary trainer, Ms. Nerissa Hendricks from Fortis Healthcare, for providing an impactful, concrete and learner's centric training workshop. The guest speaker established a good rapport with the facilitators. The session was truly rational, and had a pragmatic approach. The trainees shared their school experiences and figured out the right solutions from the resource person.

The training session aims to enable participants to know more about reactions to distress, gain knowledge about what psychological first aid is and what it is not, understand the three action principles of 'Look, Listen and Link', practiced providing PFA to someone in distress, consider complex reactions and be aware of the importance of self-care when helping others. Facilitators were made aware of 6C's Psychological First Aid Tool Kit. It covers the areas of safety and comfort, contact, to understand and address concerns, providing coping skills to empower, connecting with







support systems, caring for yourself and your colleagues.

The beneficial takeaway from this session was to establish a human connection in a non-intrusive and compassionate manner. Constructive feedback was given by facilitators. The highlight of the workshop was to "Care for Care Seekers" by implementing the noble principles 'Look, Listen and Link'. We are extremely thankful to the Ryan management for providing the platform for conducting a knowledgeable workshop for facilitators, which was actually beneficial for effective classroom management.


